Sep. 1-17 Mary Berkheiser has been invited to attend the National Juvenile Defender Center Summit in Washington, D.C., where she will conduct a caucus session with representatives of the Western Juvenile Defender Center, of which she is co-Chair. Sep. 9-12 Rachel Anderson will present two papers at the Third National People of Color Conference at Seton Hall Law School. She will be part of a Junior Faculty Development Workshop on Advice to New Faculty, and will also present a paper, "Reimagining Human Rights Law: Toward Global Regulation of Transnational Corporations.
