"Unselfish" is the best word to describe Procter Hug's years of service as Chief Judge of the Ninth Circuit. Yet, as Chief, he steadfastly responded to each crisis, often with a spark of humor that confounded those who tried to disagree with him. He oversaw the varying needs of the districts with innovative use of available resources, all the while advocating on the national scene for the additional resources necessary to administer justice fairly in the West.

Throughout his years of service on our Court, Procter, always true to his own conscience, has expressed views with which his colleagues sometimes disagreed. Yet, I have never heard an unkind word about the man. Procter has demonstrated that he is always willing to listen, but never shy with a response. On behalf of all his colleagues, I extend to him and to Barbara deep affection, gratitude, and admiration.
