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

RAQUEL ALDANA-PINDELL

Assistant Professor of Law
B.A., Arizona State University (1993)
J.D., Harvard University Law School (1997)

Professor Aldana-Pindell teaches Public International Law, Immigration Law, and International Human Rights Law. As a litigator at the Center for Justice and International Law, she prosecuted complaints regarding human rights violations and worked for stronger international protections against human rights abuses. A graduate of Harvard Law School, Professor Aldana-Pindell began her legal career at the Washington, D.C. office of the nationally known firm Jones, Day, Reavis & Pogue and has worked for the U.S. Department of Justice Civil Rights Division. While in practice, she also taught as an adjunct faculty member at the University of Baltimore. At Harvard, Professor Aldana-Pindell was an Articles Editor on the *Harvard Civil Rights-Civil Liberties Law Review*. She holds undergraduate degrees in both English and Spanish from Arizona State University, where she graduated summa cum laude and was selected to Phi Beta Kappa. In addition to international law and human rights, Professor Aldana-Pindell has scholarly interests in education law and public policy. She joined the Boyd School of Law faculty in 2000.



JENNIFER B. ANDERSON

Professor Anderson teaches Lawyering Process and joined the Boyd School of Law faculty in 2000. After graduating from the University of Michigan Law School in 1994, she practiced in Phoenix, Arizona with the prominent law firms Snell & Wilmer and Lewis & Roca. In 1998, she left private practice for public interest law, serving as staff attorney at the Arizona Center for Law in the Public Interest. There, her practice focused on litigation and appellate advocacy supporting individuals and conservation organizations on matters of environmental and natural resources law. While at Michigan, Professor Anderson was a member of the *University of Michigan Journal of Law Reform*. Long active in community service, Professor Anderson is a former member of the Board of Arizona Volunteer Lawyers for the Arts and a Past Chair of the Attorneys' Action Council of Planned Parenthood of Central and Northern Arizona.

Professor Ansson teaches Lawyering Process, Indian Law, and Commercial Law. He has authored numerous articles on these topics as well as environmental law, international law, conflict of laws, and personal jurisdiction. A 1997 graduate of the University of Oklahoma College of Law, Professor Ansson was Editor-in-Chief of the *American Indian Law Review*. After law school, he earned the advanced LL.M. legal degree at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, where he also taught as an adjunct faculty member. Professor Ansson has also served as law clerk to Justice Douglas Johnstone of the Alabama Supreme Court and has been a lawyer in private practice litigating a variety of property, land use, and environmental disputes.

ANNETTE RUTH APPELL

As a law student, Professor Appell was a member of the *Northwestern Journal of International Law and Business*. While in private litigation practice with the prominent Chicago firm of Sonnenschein, Nath and Rosenthal, she took a leave of absence to be an Assistant Public Guardian for the Cook County Public Guardian's office, representing children in child welfare cases for three years before joining a plaintiff's civil rights firm. She then was a clinical teacher at the Northwestern University Law School Children and Family Justice Center before joining the faculty of the University of South Carolina Law School. In 1998, she joined the Boyd School of Law where she teaches in the clinic and the classroom in the subjects of Child Welfare and Civil Procedure/ADR. Professor Appell's scholarship focuses on children and families in the legal system and has appeared in the *Boston University Law Review*, the *Fordham Law Review*, the *Duke Journal of Gender Law & Policy*, and other scholarly periodicals. She is also an editor and a regular columnist on adoption law for the *Adoption Quarterly*, a multi-disciplinary journal.

 J.D., University of Arizona, James E. Rogers College of Law (1984)




Professor Berkheiser graduated *magna cum laude* from the University of Arizona College of Law, where she was editor-in-chief of the *Arizona Law Review*, Order of the Coif, and named as the outstanding graduate of her class. After clerking with Arizona Supreme Court Justice Stanley Feldman, she practiced law with and was a partner in the prominent Phoenix firm Meyer, Hendricks, Victor, Osborn, and Maledon, where she specialized in professional liability defense and appellate practice. She joined the faculty of the Arizona State University College of Law as a visiting professor in 1995 and came to UNLV in 1998, where she is Director of Clinical Programs and teaches Civil Procedure/ADR and the Juvenile Justice Clinic. Her scholarly interests focus on access to justice, professional responsibility, and juvenile justice. Her most recent article in the *Journal of Psychology, Public Policy & Law* addresses clinic teaching in light of the emerging field of therapeutic jurisprudence.

Professor Birdsong worked in the Environmental and Natural Resources Division of the Department. In 1998, he took a leave of absence to serve as an Ian Axford Fellow in Public Policy in Wellington, New Zealand, studying New Zealand's specialized environmental court. He has also been an instructor at the United States District Attorneys Graduate School. He currently teaches Environmental Law and Natural Resources Law.

Upon graduation from college, Professor Brown spent four years as an officer in the United States Air Force before earning his J.D. at the Indiana University School of Law, where he served as Associate Editor of the *Indiana Law Journal*. After a short time in private practice, he earned his Master of Law Librarianship degree at the University of Washington, generally regarded as the nation's top program in law library science. Professor Brown served as Assistant Professor of Law and Assistant Law Librarian at Florida State University College of Law before becoming Director of the Law Library and Professor of Law at Arizona State University College of Law. He came to UNLV in 1998. In addition to administering the state's largest law library, Professor Brown teaches Property, Land Use, Real Estate Transactions, and Wills, Trusts & Estates. He has served as Book Review editor for the *Jurimetrics Journal of Law, Science and Technology*, published by the ABA Section on Science and Technology.

**A. CHRISTOPHER BRYANT**

As an attorney for the Senate Office of Legal Counsel, Professor Bryant was at the center of one of America's greatest legal storms -- the impeachment trial of President Clinton. He provided counsel and representation to the Senate during the trial and also defended Senate officers in federal litigation. After law school and before joining the Senate counsel staff, Professor Bryant clerked for United States Court of Appeals Judge James Buckley in the District of Columbia and then practiced law with the Washington, D.C. firm Shea & Gardner. Professor Bryant joined the Boyd School of Law faculty for Spring Semester 2000 and is an active scholar, with an article recently published in the *Cornell Law Review* and other manuscripts in progress. At UNLV, he teaches Criminal Law, Legislation, Conflict of Laws, and Federal Jurisdiction.


**JAY S. BYBEE**

Professor of Law

 J.D., Brigham Young University, J. Reuben Clark Law School (1980)

Professor Bybee is a 1980 graduate of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at Brigham Young University, where he was a member of the Editorial Board of the *Brigham Young University Law Review*. Following graduation, he served as law clerk to United States Court of Appeals Judge Donald Russell of the Fourth Circuit. Professor Bybee then was in private practice with the Washington, D.C. office of Sidley & Austin before joining the Department of Justice, first in the Office of Legal Policy and then in the Appellate Staff of the Civil Division. From 1989 to 1991, he served in the White House as Associate Counsel to the President. Professor Bybee began his law teaching career at Louisiana State University in 1991 and was appointed to the Harry S. Redmon, Jr. professorship. Professor Bybee joined the Boyd School of Law faculty in 1999 and teaches Administrative Law, Constitutional Law, and Civil Procedure/ADR. A highly regarded scholar, his research interests focus on federalism, separation of powers and the First Amendment. His articles have appeared in the *Yale Law Journal*, the *Vanderbilt Law Review*, the *Northwestern University Law Review*, and in numerous other legal periodicals.

SHANNON BYBEE

Shannon Bybee is director of the International Gaming Institute at UNLV's nationally known William F. Harrah College of Hotel Administration. Professor Bybee is an internationally recognized authority on gaming law and regulation, having served as a member of the Nevada Gaming Control Board and as an attorney in private practice prior to entering academia. Although a member of the College of Hotel Administration faculty at UNLV, Professor Bybee regularly teaches Gaming Law at the Boyd School of Law. A 1969 graduate of the University of Utah Law School, Professor Bybee is the author of many articles on gaming law and policy. After graduation, he clerked for the Nevada Supreme Court. He is also a founder and Past President of the International Association of Gaming Attorneys.

ROBERT I. CORREALES

Professor Correales came to UNLV in 1998 after serving for five years as Assistant Dean for Student and Academic Affairs at the University of Wisconsin Law School. In addition to being an administrator, Professor Correales has taught courses or seminars in disability law, law and contemporary problems, communication law, environmental law, discrimination law, and professional responsibility. He has also supervised an externship program focusing on children with disabilities. At UNLV, Professor Correales teaches Torts and administers the Judicial Externship Program. A 1990 graduate of the University of Kansas Law School, where he was student director of the Haskell Indian Junior College Legal Aid Clinic, he holds an LL.M. from Georgetown and worked as a supervising attorney at Georgetown University Law Center's Institute for Public Representation, where he helped found the Institute's environmental law clinic. In that capacity, he also helped prosecute several successful actions for social change, including one expanding public access for persons with disabilities and another expanding citizen access to FCC-regulated media. Professor Correales's research interests involve worker rights, immigration, and medical malpractice.

DOUGLAS L. GRANT

Professor Grant is a leading expert on water law, as well as a teacher of property law for nearly 30 years. A graduate of the University of Colorado School of Law, he was Editor-in-Chief of the *Colorado Law Review*. Professor Grant practiced law in Denver, began his teaching career at the University of Idaho College of Law, and joined the Boyd School of Law faculty in 1999. His casebook, *Water Law: Cases and Materials* (co-authored with George Gould) was published in its sixth edition during 2000. He also wrote part of the multi-volume treatise *Waters and Water Rights*. Professor Grant has also written many articles on water law and policy and frequently lectures on these topics outside the law school. In addition to teaching Water Law, Professor Grant teaches Property, Land Use, and Natural Resources Law.



LYNNE HENDERSON

Professor Henderson, a graduate of Stanford Law School, is one of the nation's leading scholars in feminism and legal theory, where her influential articles are frequently cited. She began her teaching career at Florida State University College of Law, moved to Cleveland-Marshall College of Law, and then to the University of Indiana before joining the Boyd School of Law faculty during Fall Semester 2000. She has also been a Teaching Fellow and Scholar-in-Residence at Stanford Law School. While in law school, she was Associate Editor of the *Stanford Law Review*. At UNLV, Professor Henderson will be teaching Constitutional Law, Criminal Law, Criminal Procedure, Feminist Legal Thought, and Jurisprudence. She has also taught Contract Law and Labor Law.



LEAH KANE

Professor Kane has taught Lawyering Process at UNLV since 1999 and also teaches Evidence. Prior to joining the faculty, she served as a litigation attorney and Director of the Law Student Community Service Program at Clark County Legal Services. She has also been a civil litigation attorney in private practice and an assistant public defender in Florida. Professor Kane is a 1990 graduate of Emory University School of Law, with a B.A. from Colgate University. She is extremely active in local and state bar association activity and currently serves on the Board of Editors of *Nevada Lawyer*.

A 1980 graduate of Columbia Law School, Professor Kindred has a wealth of high-powered experience practicing law. She has worked in the Securities and Exchange Commission's Office of Legal Counsel, the corporate legal staff of General Electric Co., the counsel's office of Old Dominion University, and in a number of administrative and professorial capacities at William & Mary's Marshall-Wythe School of Law and Institute of Bill of Rights Law. She left William & Mary to join the Boyd School of Law faculty in 1999. Professor Kindred teaches Contracts, Family Law, Children in Society, and Remedies. She is active in many professional organizations and an active scholar in the areas of family law, education law, discrimination law, and children's rights. Her book, *Selected Problems of Children in Society*, is scheduled for publication in 2001. At Columbia, Professor Kindred was Submissions Editor of the *Columbia Human Rights Law Review*.

MARY LAFRANCE

Professor LaFrance is a noted expert on intellectual property as well as a teacher and scholar of tax law. A 1986 graduate of Duke University's law school, where she served as Executive Editor of the *Duke Law Journal*, she clerked for United States Appellate Judge Harry Edwards in the District of Columbia Circuit and then practiced tax law in Washington with Fried, Frank, Harris, Shriver & Jacobson, where she worked extensively with tax expert Martin Ginsburg. She began full-time law teaching in 1990 at Florida State and moved to UNLV in 1999. At the Boyd School of Law, Professor LaFrance teaches Income Tax, Entertainment Law, and several courses concerning Intellectual Property, which encompasses patent, copyright, and trademark issues. Her casebook, *Intellectual Property: Cases and Materials* (co-authored with David Lange and Gary Myers) was published by West in 1998. She is a frequent author of law review articles related to her teaching interests.

BRUCE MARKELL

Professor Markell is a 1980 graduate of the University of California-Davis School of Law, where he served as Editor-in-Chief of the *UC-Davis Law Review*. After graduation, he clerked for then United States Court of Appeals Judge Anthony Kennedy before entering private practice in Los Angeles, working at national firms Morrison & Foerster and Sidley & Austin, becoming a partner before entering law teaching. He joined the Indiana University School of Law faculty in 1990. He has been a visiting professor at Harvard, UC-Davis and Emory and teaches Contracts, Sales, International Sales, Payment Systems, Secured Transactions, and Bankruptcy at the Boyd School of Law, which he joined in 1999. Professor Markell is an internationally known scholar of bankruptcy and commercial law, having published many articles and treatise chapters on these topics, and is a frequent lecturer as well. He has advised the government of Indonesia regarding bankruptcy and commercial law and has represented the International Bar Association at sessions of UNCITRAL, the United Nations's commercial law organization. He is currently completing work on law school casebooks on contract law, bankruptcy, and commercial law.

THOMAS B. MCAFFEE

Professor McAfee came to the Boyd School of Law after nearly 20 years in legal education at Southern Illinois University. During the course of his career, he has taught many subjects but specializes in Constitutional Law, the Bill of Rights, and Legal History. His constitutional law scholarship focuses on the original intent of the Constitution and the Ninth Amendment, on which he is arguably the nation's leading expert. Professor McAfee's book *Inherent Rights, the Written Constitution, and Popular Sovereignty: The Founder's Understanding* was published during 2000 and he is a frequent contributor to law reviews, having published in the *Columbia Law Review* and elsewhere. Professor McAfee holds his J.D. from the University of Utah, where he was Articles Editor of the *Utah Law Review*. After graduation, he clerked for United States Court of Appeals Judge J. Clifford Wallace and practiced law with the prominent San Diego-based firm of Gray, Cary, Ames & Frye.



ANN MCGINLEY

 J.D., University of Pennsylvania Law School (1982)

Professor McGinley is a 1982 cum laude graduate of the University of Pennsylvania Law School, where she was a member of the Law Review. After graduation, she clerked for United States District Judge Joseph Lord in the Eastern Division of Pennsylvania and practiced commercial and employment litigation in Minnesota and New Jersey before beginning law teaching at Brooklyn Law School. A nationally known scholar, her articles on employment law have appeared in the *Ohio State Law Journal*, the *Arizona Law Review*, the *Boston College Law Review*, the *Florida Law Review*, and several other legal periodicals, most recently the *Cornell Journal of Law & Public Policy*. She is currently a Senior Editor and chapter author of *The Alternative Workforce*, to be published by the ABA in 2001. Professor McGinley teaches Disability Law, Employment Law, Employment Discrimination, Labor Law, Civil Procedure, and Pretrial Litigation. She joined the Boyd School of Law faculty from Florida State College of Law in 1999. While at Florida State, she served as Special Consultant to the Florida Constitutional Revision Commission and at UNLV has served as a consultant to the National Judicial College in Reno.



RICHARD MORGAN

Dean Morgan served at the helm of both the Arizona State University College of Law and the University of Wyoming College of Law prior to coming to UNLV to be the founding Dean of the Boyd School of Law. He earned his B.A. in Political Science at the University of California, Berkeley in 1967 and received his J.D. in 1971 from UCLA, where he was number one in his class and an editor of the *UCLA Law Review*. After graduation, he practiced corporate law in Los Angeles before joining the Arizona State University College of Law faculty. In 1987, he left ASU to become Dean at the University of Wyoming College of Law, returning to ASU as Dean in 1990. In 1997, he became the founding Dean of the Boyd School of Law at UNLV. Dean Morgan teaches Business Organizations and related courses in Corporate Law. Long active in both education and bar activities, he is one of the nation's best known and respected legal educators.

Professor Pindell earned his J.D. in 1996 from Harvard University, where he was Executive Editor of the *Harvard Black Letter Law Journal*. Most recently, he taught at the University of Baltimore, working in the school's Community Development Clinic, teaching and planning an innovative curriculum in community development and the law. At UNLV, Professor Pindell teaches Business Organizations, including both business ownership forms and corporate structure as well as Securities Law and Corporate Finance. He has also worked as a staff attorney with Empowerment Legal Services Program, Inc. and as an adjunct professor at the University of Maryland School of Law, supervising students in community development legal work. Professor Pindell's scholarly interests focus on property and housing regulation, particularly issues of nondiscrimination and access.

Professor Pollman is an experienced legal educator who taught at the University of Illinois and Stetson University law schools prior to coming to UNLV in 1998. She received her J.D. magna cum laude from the University of Arizona College of Law in 1990 and served as Articles Editor of the *Arizona Law Review* as well as a legal writing instructor. At both Illinois and Stetson, she directed the legal writing programs and has the same responsibilities at UNLV, where she administers and oversees the Law School's Lawyering Process curriculum. Professor Pollman teaches Property and Indian Law in addition to Lawyering Process. Her scholarly interests include pedagogical issues and issues of legal interpretation and construction.

Professor Stempel served as an editor of the *Yale Law Journal* and was a co-founder of the *Yale Law & Policy Review* prior to clerking for United States District Judge Raymond Broderick and practicing law as a civil litigation attorney. Before joining the UNLV faculty in 1999, Professor Stempel taught at Brooklyn Law School and Florida State University College of Law, where he served as Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and was the Fonvielle & Hinkle Professor of Litigation. Professor Stempel has written or co-written several books, including *Law of Insurance Contract Disputes* (2d ed. 1999), *Foundations of the Law* (1994), *Fundamentals of Pretrial Litigation* (4th ed. 2000), and *Motion Practice* (3d ed. 1998) as well as many law review articles. His teaching and research interests include Alternative Dispute Resolution, Civil Procedure, Insurance Law, and Lawyer Professional Responsibility.

After law school, Professor Thomas moved to Las Vegas and entered private practice with the prominent Las Vegas law firm Schreck Morris, specializing in litigation and employment law. Prior to attending law school, she was an English teacher in the Cornwall-Lebanon School District in Lebanon, Pennsylvania. Professor Thomas teaches Lawyering Process and Pretrial Litigation.

After graduation from law school, Professor Tobias engaged in private practice with Hunton & Williams in Richmond, Virginia from 1972 to 1975, when he joined the faculty at the University of Montana School of Law. He joined the Boyd School of Law faculty in 1998 and has taught Administrative Law, Constitutional Law, Environmental Law, Federal Courts, Land Use Planning, Products Liability, and Torts. Although his research interests are just as diverse, Professor Tobias specializes in teaching Torts and his most recent writings have focused on federal civil justice reform, federal appellate structure, the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure, and federal judicial selection. He is a prolific scholar, having authored more than 100 law review articles, including publications in the *California Law Review*, the *Columbia Law Review*, the *Cornell Law Review*, and the *Stanford Law Review*. Professor Tobias is also heavily involved in law reform activity and is a member of the American Law Institute, the Study Committee to Review the Nevada Rules of Civil Procedure, and other groups. He also served on the District Court Local Rules Review Committee of the Ninth Circuit Chief Judges Conference.
