

1995-96 SALT Salary Survey

Howard A. Glickstein, former SALT President and Dean of Touro College Jacob D. Fuchsberg Law Center, has completed his survey of law school salaries for the 1995-96 academic year. The survey represents the median salaries for each of the three faculty ranks, in alphabetical order by school, in each of seven regions. Information was received from only 96 schools, a 55 percent response rate. SALT members who are affiliated with any of the 80 non-responding schools are encouraged to seek future cooperation from their institutions.


